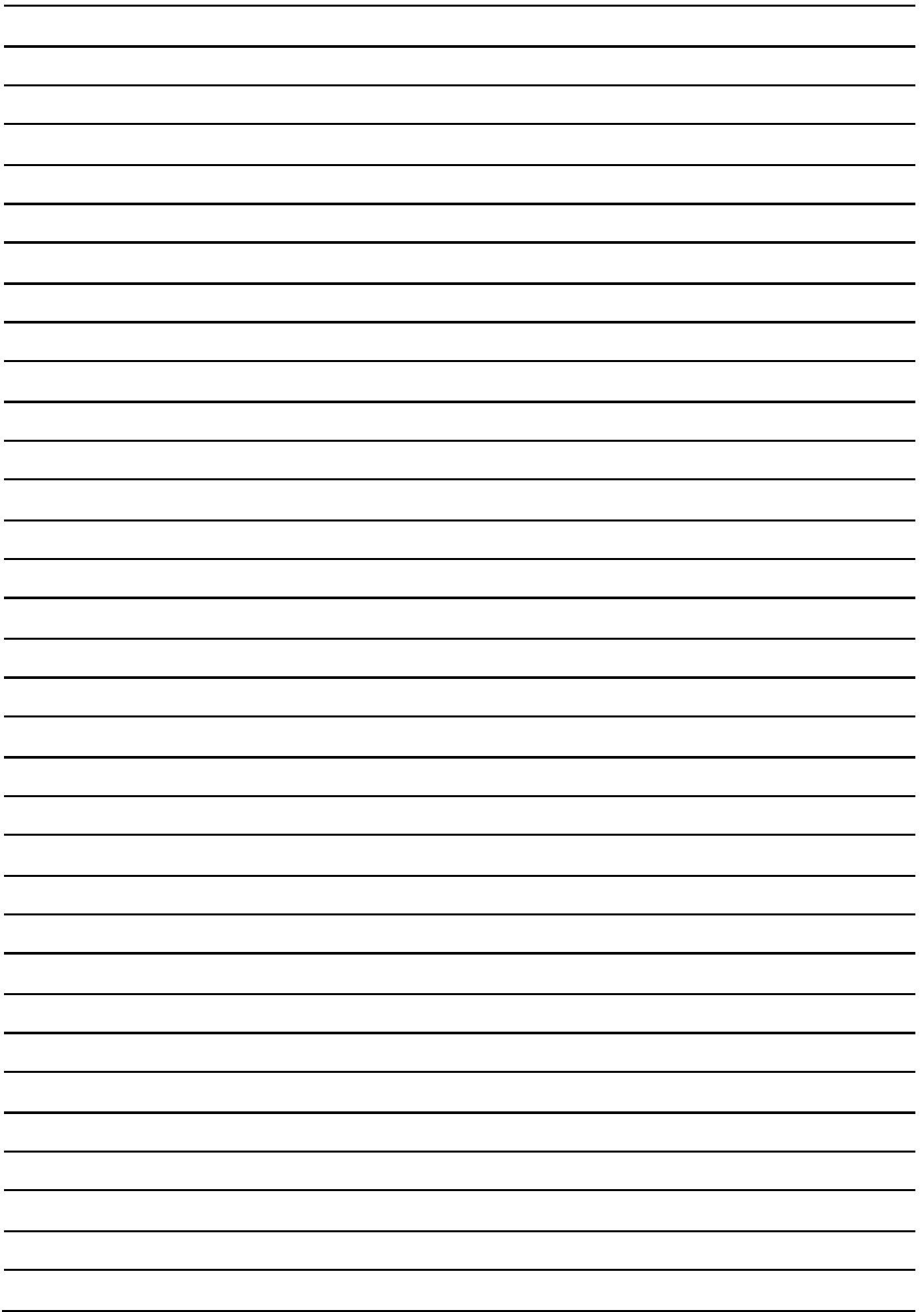

Writing Assignment: After listening to "[Marisol McDonald Doesn't Match](#)," create a special piece of writing about yourself.

Here's what you need to do:

1. Think about what makes you unique:
 - Your favorite hobbies
 - Special talents you have
 - Dreams for the future
 - Family traditions
 - Interesting stories about your life
 - Things you love to do
2. Write 2-3 paragraphs about yourself on lined paper:
 - Each paragraph should have at least 5 sentences.
 - Include at least 3 things that make you different from others.
 - Explain why these things are important to you.
 - Match your writing style to your personality.
3. Remember to:
 - Use complete sentences.
 - Check your spelling.
 - Use correct punctuation.
 - Make sure your grammar is correct.
 - Read your work out loud to check if it makes sense.

Your writing will go with your self-portrait, so make your words as colorful and special as your artwork! Just like Marisol McDonald, celebrate what makes you different and unique. There's only one YOU in the whole world – let's share your story!



Self-Portrait Drawing Instructions- [portraitframe](#)

Materials Needed:

- Picture frame template
- Colored pencils, crayons, or markers
- Regular pencil
- Mirror

Step-by-Step Directions:

1. Look in the mirror and observe your special features. What makes you, YOU?
2. Using a regular pencil first:
 - Draw a large circle for your head (make it big – fill most of the paper!).
 - Add your neck and shoulders.
 - Sketch your eyes, nose, and mouth.
 - Don't forget your ears!
 - Add your hairstyle.
3. Make it unique:
 - Include special details like freckles, glasses, or dimples.
 - Show your personality through your expression.
 - Draw any special items that represent you (favorite hair clips, earrings, or necklace).
4. Add color:
 - Use the correct colors for your skin tone, hair, and eyes.
 - Make sure to press firmly with your colors to make them bright and vibrant.
 - Color neatly within the lines.
 - Add shading to make your portrait look more realistic.
5. Final touch:
 - Add a colorful background that shows your personality

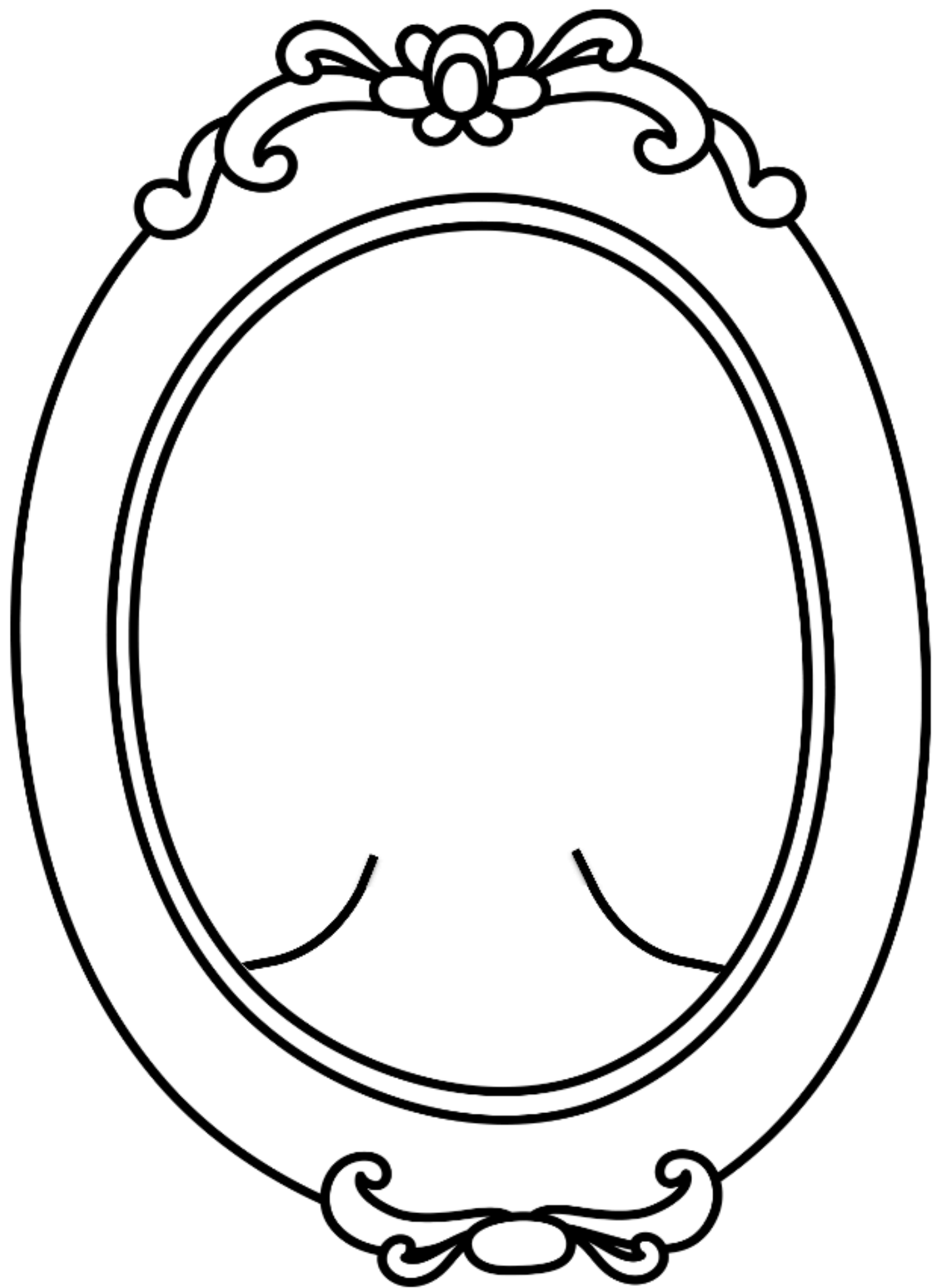
Remember:

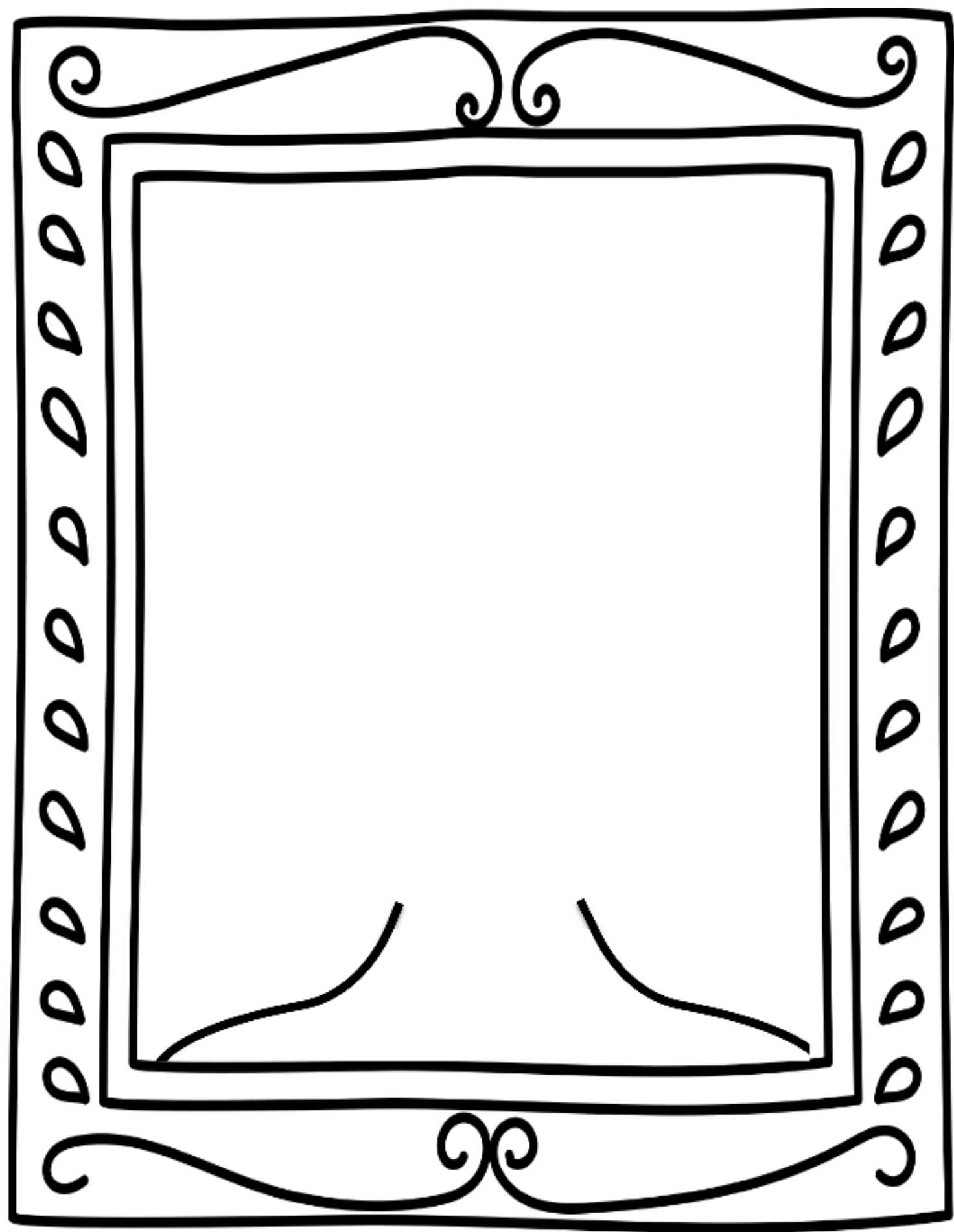
- Take your time
